President's Report

The start of a new term is often a time for reflection and consolidation of the previous With Annual term. an Implementation Plan in place, schools are looking for that next step to improve the outcomes for their students. In a perfect world, school leaders will have all the necessary resources at their disposal to achieve their desired outcomes; we do not live in a perfect world. Challenges always exist and one could argue that challenges and overcoming the challenges is what the role of the makes principal rewarding, albeit stressful at times.

In the past month two reports have been released, the <u>ACU Principal</u> <u>Health and Wellbeing survey</u> and <u>ACARA's updated National Report on</u> <u>Schooling in Australia</u>. Two quite different sets of data; however, I would argue that they are interrelated to the work of the principal class. Unfortunately, the findings of the ACU report are not positive in any sense of the word.

While some may attempt to make the best of the data, for example, principals experience of violence, that Victoria's data is better than the other states and territories, this is a fundamental misuse of the survey results. This longitudinal survey started in 2011, so the data sets are of significance; for example, over the term of the survey the violence experienced by leaders as increased by 75%. ACARA's recent data sets focused on apparent (my emphasis) retention; a data set that was widely reported in the media. Government schools had a significantly lower apparent retention (75.9%) than non-government schools (90.1%), both Catholic and independent.

The headline data suggests that government schools are not as effective as non-government schools in retaining students until the end of Year 12; however. the number of caveats associated with this data are extensive. The report provides twelve caveats, with one caveat having seven sub-caveats! The report states that "it is not currently possible to calculate actual (my emphasis) retention rates." Given the number of limitations placed on the data, why publish it in the first place? And what message does it send to the community about our schools?

Data is a key component of assessing the success of a school; however, the misuse of data or more significantly the misunderstanding of data has the

potential to create even more stress for school leaders. How often do we triangulate school data with data sets that are external? Schools are not islands in their community, they are a microcosm of the community and as such there is the potential for external data sets to inform school data sets. There is a reasonable concern about attendance at school and there is much discussion as to why the decline and what are the actions needed to reverse the decline. For example, do local youth statistics corelate with crime attendance data? Interestingly, I would argue that comparing that data would provide for an interesting discussion. Regardless of which data sets we're comparing, we all need to be mindful that data doesn't give you the answers, data suggests which questions you need to ask. All too often, in the words of Scottish poet Andrew Lang, we use, "statistics much like a drunk uses a lamppost: for support, not illumination"! Data sets should be used to pose questions, not provide answers.

The Education Ministers' Meeting (EMM), the meeting of all state and territory ministers with the Federal Minister for Education, Jason Clare, convened in Perth on 26 April. This meeting has most recently focused on the National Schools Reform Agreement (funding) and also the teacher shortage, which Minister Clare, has labelled a 'crisis'. School funding is a discussion for another time; however, the teacher shortage remains of continuing concern for school leaders across the country. More importantly though is the health and wellbeing of school leaders and the acknowledgement that action needs to continue to be taken to support school leaders lest we find ourselves with a leadership crisis if we're not already in one. At the ASPA Summit in Canberra at the end of last term (see report from VASSP Deputy President, Belinda Hudak below) the ASPA President, Andy Mison challenged the Federal Minister to privilege principal health and wellbeing in the national teacher workforce action plan; a challenge the minister readily accepted. At the EMM, the presidents of ASPA and the Australian Primary Principals Association (APPA) made a presentation to the meeting. Thev proposed two specific outcomes; namely, that EMM make a public statement of support explicitly for principals and school leaders, and establish an EMM sponsored working group to develop effective strategies to support school leaders. Both actions have been accepted by the EMM and were included in the communique from Minister Clare.

While much of the national discussion on education is strategic, school leaders are dealing with the tactical; that is, the daily operations of their schools ensuring the best quality education for their students. Principals have a complex and demanding job, which is nevertheless highly rewarding. However, the stresses that come with the position need to be managed and while the EMM acknowledged the work being done around the country to support school leaders much still needs to be done. In meantime, the school leaders will continue to be confronted the myriad

challenges of school leadership. At the SGM last Friday, we were inspired by Paralympian Jess Gallagher. Life is full of challenges and the life of a school leader is equally full of challenges. Jess made the following powerful comment, which I believe is sound advice for all school leaders, "It's not what you see...it's how you choose to see it".

Australian Secondary Principals' Association 2024 National Education Summit

Equity in Australian Secondary Education: Crossing the Divide

Australian Secondary Principals' Association (ASPA) 2024 National Education Summit was held in Canberra, on Monday 25 March and Tuesday 26 March.

The aim of the summit was to have a constructive and collaborative conversation about the future of secondary school education in Australia. The focus was to shape and progress a national agenda for the 2025 federal election, with an emphasis on equity of opportunity for every Australian student at the heart of policy.

ASPA has identified these as the most significant priorities for our school leaders

and their communities. The outcome of the summit was to collate ideas and feedback to guide the national policy debate over the next 12 months and start a new national conversation led by government school principals.

DAY ONE

Hosted by Telopea Park School, the day commenced with a Principals Council attended by principals and association presidents to highlight the issues faced across the states and to discuss the possible solutions. Key themes focused on funding and the diversity of support schools are required to provide students, families, and their communities.

DAY TWO

The second day of the Summit commenced with a book launch from Author, Dean Ashenden **"Unbeaching the Whale – Can Australia's Schooling Be Reformed".** A panel discussion on the themes of the book, facilitated by Anthony Mackay AM alongside Dean Ashenden and Prof. Pasi Sahlberg.

Day two held Summit workshops and the panels/sessions were structured into three thematic sessions:

- School funding and Educational Outcomes: The Equity Gap in Australia
- Equity and Opportunity in Senior Secondary Assessment and Certification
- The Role of Principals in Enabling Equity and Wellbeing in our Schools

This led into the Summit, which boasted representatives of Principal class, Association Presidents and Education Departments from all states and territories. Andy Mison, President ASPA opened the Summit and welcomed Jason Clare MP, Federal Minister for Education, for a sit-down discussion. Minister Clare was very clear on his desire to see increased funding for Government Schools. He also acknowledged the challenges our schools are continuing to face including teacher shortages and additional demands on schools to support students and their families.

Compered by Jane Carro AM, each session began with an overview of the challenges which assisted to set the scene for a panel discussion that followed. Through each session the table discussions presented an opportunity for the representatives to share the challenges or supports in their State or Territory. Each table discussed and shared back to concerns and ideas for solutions as well as communicate supports that are working well in different Departments. These were collated by the ASPA to form key items for discussion with different Ministers and Departments in upcoming meetings and other advocacy opportunities.

The attendees also had the opportunity to hear from Senator Sarah Henderson, Shadow Minister for Education and Senator Penny Allman-Payne, Greens Education Spokesperson. Senator Allman-Payne spoke passionately about the need to fully fund State Schools and acknowledged the great work of schools and school leaders, especially to support most disadvantaged students. our Senator Henderson discussed the teacher shortage and focused on the importance of finding solutions.

The essential need to fully fund State Schools was an inherent focus of this session and recognised that State educating Schools are our most disadvantaged young people of which the gap is only increasing. The breadth of support that schools provide students and families in their communities was also highlighted as increasing challenge for our State Secondary Schools particularly in mental health, supporting attendance and connecting to aligned health professionals.

SESSION 2: Equity and Opportunity in Senior Secondary Assessment & Certification

The key discussion points raised in this session were linked to formative assessments process and it was raised by many that these (particularly the ATAR) are no longer fit for purpose. With only 25% of students using an ATAR to gain entry to university which poses the question; is this the best way to assess our students?

Conversation on teaching skills and capabilities were raised as well as bridging the gap for regional participation in tertiary studies. The panel shared alternative and inclusive program opportunities. The Vocational Major was the focus of the share from Victoria through Scott Widmer.

The subject matter for this was the presentation of the findings from the 2023 Australian Principal Occupational Health, Safety and Wellbeing by Dr Therese Dicke, Program Lead, Institute for Positive Psychology and Education, Australian Catholic University. It was evident through discussions that Victorian Department of Education has had more focus in this space than other States and Territories, with some state representatives in the panel discussion not even acknowledging there is an issue or concern.

Concluding comments

Bringing education leaders from across the country was an excellent opportunity to share experiences, expertise and learn from each other and our systems. Although the gap and different approaches between states was very evident (and we will not have a unified national system any time soon), the need to come together more often to benefit from the success and experiences from all states and territories is certainly something to continue to work towards. It is ASPA's hope to continue the Summit annually.



LITERACY AND NUMERACY ACHIEVEMENT OUTCOMES FOR VICTORIAN STUDENTS

The Examination

The Victorian Auditor General's Office (VAGO) has examined whether the Department of Education is improving literacy and numeracy achievement outcomes for all Victorian government school students.

Findings

Generally:

- Since 2012, literacy and numeracy outcomes for Victorian government school students overall are stable.
- The department's budget performance measures of student outcomes are not a fair or transparent presentation of students' skills.



For Aboriginal students and students experiencing disadvantage:

- Since 2012, the proportion of these students below the expected level has been stable or increased.
- The department is not improving outcomes for these students.
- These students are not learning at a rate that will close the gap with other students.

Recommendations


VAGO made 3 recommendations:

The Department should:

- widen its literacy reporting to include writing as well as reading
- improve the way it reports student outcomes in its performance measures
- make government school literacy and numeracy results more accessible to the public.







Their alumni programs have got off to a flying start. Volunteer alumni have returned to their schools to inspire students about study and careers.


